5		Futenma and aver that the Government of Japan (Japan) would be responsible for
6		funding any future relocation of MCAS Futenma. The remaining allegations in \P
7		21 are vague and ambiguous and, therefore, denied.
8	22.	Defendants admit the allegations of \P 22.
9	23.	The allegations in \P 23 are vague and ambiguous and, therefore, denied. To the
		extent a response is required, defendants admit that, since 1945, the United States
10		has maintained a military presence on Okinawa, Japan. Furthermore, an
11		Agreement between the United States and Japan concerning the Ryukyu Islands
12		(Okinawa is within the Ryukyu Islands chain) and the Daito Islands (the Ryukyu
13		Agreement) was signed by both nations on June 17, 1971, and became effective
14		May 15, 1972. Under the Ryukyu Agreement, the United States relinquished to
15		Japan all rights and interests under Article III of the Treaty of Peace signed by
16		both nations on September 8, 1951, and Japan assumed full responsibility and
17		authority for the exercise of all and any powers of administration, legislation, and
18		jurisdiction over the territory and inhabitants of the Ryukyu Islands. Defendants
19		aver that Japan granted the use of facilities and areas in the Ryukyu Islands in
20		accordance with the Treaty of Mutual Cooperation and Security between the
21		United States and Japan signed on January 19, 1960, and its related arrangements
22		(the Treaty) and further aver that the Ryukyu Agreement and Treaty are the best
23		evidence of their contents, and defendants deny any allegations contrary to the
24		language and plain meaning of these documents.
25	24.	Defendants admit the allegation in \P 24 that the Treaty was signed on January 19,
25		1960. The remaining allegations of \P 24 constitute plaintiffs' characterization of
		the Treaty, which constitutes the best evidence of its contents, and defendants
27		deny any allegations contrary to the language and plain meaning of the Treaty.

1	25.	Defendants admit the allegation in \P 25 that the Special Action Committee on
2		Okinawa (SACO) was established in November 1995 by Japan and the United
3		States. Defendants aver that the purpose of the SACO was to strengthen the
4		Japan-United States alliance. Defendants further admit that on April 15, 1996, the
5		SACO issued an Interim Report recommending the return of MCAS Futenma to
6		the people of Okinawa – after replacement facilities are constructed and have
7		become operational. Defendants aver that the SACO recommended a total of 27
8		initiatives in its Interim Report was 27, rather than 26 initiatives, as alleged.
9	26.	Defendants admit the allegation in ¶ 26 that the Security Consultative Committee
		(SCC) approved the SACO Final Report (Final Report) on December 2, 1996.
10		Defendants admit the Final Report established the Futenma Implementation
11		Group (FIG), but aver the Final Report is the best evidence of its contents and
12		deny any allegations contrary to the language and plain meaning of that document.
13		The remaining allegations of \P 26 constitute plaintiffs' characterization of the
14		Final Report, which provides the best evidence of its contents and deny any
15		allegations contrary to the language and plain meaning of the Final Report.
16	27.	Defendants deny the allegations of ¶ 27 of the Complaint. Defendants aver that
17		the "Occupational Requirements and Concept of Operations for MCAS Futenma
18		Relocation, Okinawa, Japan" document – dated September 29, 1997 – referenced
19		in § 27 of the Complaint, has been superseded by the "MCAS Futenma Relocation
20		Preliminary Operational Requirements" document, forwarded to Japan on
21		February 15, 2001. Defendants aver that this "2001 Preliminary Operational
22		Requirements" document is the best evidence of its contents and deny any
23		allegations contrary to the language and plain meaning of that document.
24		Defendants further aver that the "2001 Preliminary Operational Requirements"
25		document does not identify any potential relocation sites for MCAS Futenma.
26	28.	The allegations of \P 28 consist of plaintiffs' characterization of the "1997
		Operational Requirements" document, which provides the best evidence of its
27		contents and which has been superseded by the "2001 Preliminary Operational

1		Requirements" document. To the extent that a response is required, defendants
2		deny those allegations. Defendants aver that, in July 2002, Japan and the
3		Okinawan Prefecture Government issued a "Basic Plan" that rejects the Sea-
4		Based Facility concept discussed in the "1997 Operational Requirements"
5		document and calls instead for the MCAS Futenma replacement facility to be
6		constructed via landfill method. The "Basic Plan" issued by Japan and the
7		Okinawan Prefecture Government provides that the final location of the facility
8		will be selected based upon an environmental impact assessment, which Japan
9		currently is preparing in accordance with Japanese law.
	29.	The allegations of \P 29 are vague and ambiguous and, therefore, denied.
10	30.	The allegations of \P 30 constitute plaintiffs' characterization of alleged
11		congressional testimony, which can be documented by reference to the
12		Congressional Record or other congressional documents and which provide the
13		best evidence of the testimony. Defendants deny any allegations contrary to the
14		language and plain meaning of the relevant congressional documents.
15	31.	The allegations of \P 31 are vague and ambiguous and, therefore, denied.
16		Defendants deny that any surveys are planned for December 2003 and aver that
17		any "underwater construction surveys," if conducted, would represent action taken
18		by the Government of Japan pursuant to Japanese law.
19	32-34.	The allegations of $\P\P$ 32-34 consist of legal conclusions, requiring no response.
20		To the extent that a response is required, defendants aver that the National
21		Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) is the best evidence of its contents and deny
22		any allegations contrary to the language and plain meaning of that statute.
23	35.	Defendants admit the allegation in \P 35 that the Okinawa Dugong is listed as an
24		"endangered" species of marine mammal under the Endangered Species Act
25		(ESA), but aver that the allegation in the first sentence of \P 35, to the effect that
26		the species is "globally threatened," is too vague and ambiguous to enable
20		defendants to admit or deny the allegation, which defendants, therefore, deny.
		Defendants lack information sufficient to admit or deny the allegations of the

17	2.	2. Plaintiffs lack standing under Article III of the United States Constitution.		
18	3.	3. The First Amended Complaint is not ripe for judicial review.		
19	4.	4. The First Amended Complaint is moot with respect to allegations concerning the 1997		
20	Operational Requirements document, which no longer remains in effect.			
21	5.	5. Plaintiffs have failed to join necessary and indispensable parties to this litigation.		
22	6. The First Amended Complaint must be dismissed as nonjusticiable and prudentially for			
23	reasons of comity under the Act of State doctrine with respect to actions taken within			
24	Japan by the Government of Japan and the prefectural and municipal governmental			
25		entities	s of Japan.	
26	7. The First Amended Complaint must be dismissed for reasons of sovereign immunity.			
27	8.	Plaintiffs have failed to state a claim upon which relief can be granted.		
28	9. Plaintiffs have failed to exhaust their administrative remedies.
